Rayle EMC partners with CoBank to award four Sharing Success grants to charitable organizations

ayle EMC recently had the opportunity to participate in a unique and exciting community program called the Sharing Success program. Aimed at supporting local communities and people, the grant is made possible by our board of directors, in partnership with CoBank—a national nonprofit cooperative bank owned by the rural American cooperatives it services. The \$5 million fund is a cornerstone of CoBank's corporate citizenship efforts, matching donations by the bank's customers to nonprofit organizations in their communities.

Sharing Success is a matching grant program created by CoBank in 2012. The cooperative bank partners with its customers, like Rayle EMC, to support the causes and organizations they care about. CoBank customers can apply for matching grants each year. This year, Rayle EMC awarded \$2,000 to each recipient, and CoBank matched the funds. A total of \$4,000 went Continued on page 22D

Rayle EMC sponsors local student to attend co-op youth leadership conference

uliana Prestenbach of Washington was sponsored by Rayle EMC to attend the Georgia Cooperative Council Youth Leadership Conference held at the FFA/ FCCLA Center July 8-12, 2024. Juliana is the daughter of Jessica Pullum of Washington.

At the conference, known as "Co-op Camp," she joined 34 other young leaders from Georgia and Virginia

for a week of engaging leadership and learning sessions through interactive activities and outdoor adventures. The event provided opportunities for growth in community leadership, problem-solving, relationship-building and communication in a relaxed environment. Sponsored by members of the Georgia Cooperative Council, including Rayle EMC, the conference highlighted the impact of cooperatives on communities and how youth can be a part of them.

One of this year's teens said, "Co-op camp is an amazing experience for anyone who plans to be a leader in their future career. You learn the group skills needed to efficiently work well with others in a fun environment."

Camp participants developed new leadership skills by

practicing them with peers and new friends. Interactive workshops included a personality profile session to enhance teamwork and a session with tips on how to navigate social interactions more effectively.

Another student commented, "Co-op camp is awesome and gives valuable information for us to take back home and use in our daily lives."

Another added, "It's so much fun getting to know like-minded people and definitely an experience that can't compare to anything."

Throughout the week, students engaged with representatives from Farm Credit Associations, Georgia EMC, Go Energy Credit Union, Pineland Telephone Cooperative and Adam Schwartz of The Cooperative Way.

These presenters highlighted how their organizations embody the Seven Cooperative Principles: voluntary and open membership, democratic member control, members' economic participation, autonomy and independence, education and training, cooperation among cooperatives and concern for community.

"Supporting and encouraging leadership growth

among our youth is crucial. This weeklong conference not only brings the seven cooperative principles to life but also helps teenagers develop essential leadership and soft skills in an enjoyable setting," says General Manager Tony Griffin of Rayle EMC.

The group visited Walton EMC and Godfrey Dairy to observe these principles in action. Alongside these educational experiences, the camp featured a high-ropes course, mud course and team-building activities, fostering strong friendships and memorable moments.

As one student remarked, "Co-op camp is a fantastic opportunity to make new friends,

enjoy outdoor activities and learn about the cooperative business model. It's an unforgettable experience."

Celebrate farm safety in September

orking on a farm can be dangerous. As a reminder, farm communities have celebrated National Farm Safety and Health Week every September since 1944. This year's observance is Sept. 15-21.

For many areas of the country, the fall harvest season is one of the busiest, but also one of the most dangerous for our nation's farmers and farmworkers. Data from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics shows the agriculture industry is consistently at the highest risk for occupational injuries and fatalities, with 453 fatalities in 2021, or an equivalent of 19.5 deaths per 100,000 workers. Between 2021-2022, there were 21,020 injuries in agricultural production that required days away from work.



Many of those injuries and deaths are preventable. During National Farm Safety and Health Week, share these safety tips with friends and family members who work in agriculture:

- Equip tractors with roll-over protective structures (ROPS) and keep proper guards in place on power take-off units (PTO) and other moving parts.
- Ride your tractor alone. Most are designed for one passenger.
- Roadway crashes that involve farm equipment are five times more likely to end with a fatality, but proper signage, lights and reflective safety strips can help farmers stay visible on rural roads.
- Wear protective equipment for all farm work, especially when using power tools. Safety goggles, dust masks, face shields and hearing protection should be readily available to anyone on the farm.
- Keep power tools in good condition, and check the cords and plugs for wear before using.
- Power tools should be properly grounded or double-insulated.
- Don't leave children unsupervised or give them chores they can't safely handle. Stress the importance of safety.
- Organize a Farm Safety Day for the children in your farm community. Plan games and activities that teach about safety.
